
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
Global Trends in Human Mortality 1990-2020










VIRUS SPREAD AS ECOLOGY

ZOONOTIC VIRAL ECOLOGY







Agricultural area expansion needs can be met by internal expansion or by agricultural expansion in other countries and importation of feedcrops and/or meat products. This analysis addresses only beef, chicken, and pork it does not include eggs, other meat sources, or dairy, which would increase area projections.


The righteous shall live by (my) faithfulness.

Opportunity # 3 Sabbath (Sabbath Year)



"The land is to have a year of rest" (Lev. 25:5).


